2. FPT Terminal & Durban Container Terminal Operations Update

Terminal	Comments
Pier 1	Terminal windbound Wednesday 21 st May. Citrus containers were obstructed from entering the terminal.
Pier 2	Terminal experienced system errors Wednesday 21 st May resulting in congestion entering Pier 1 and Pier 2 for most of the day. Citrus containers were obstructed from entering the terminal and TPT communicated to hold back all containers. Congestion was cleared by today..
MFT Terminal	4 th Japan vessel Crown Opal due to commence 25 th May. High stock capacity could result in congestion, advisable to communicate with logistics agents to ensure trucks can be accepted.
FPT Terminal	3 rd Japan vessel Andalucia Star in port planned to commence 24th May. High stock capacity could result in congestion, advisable to communicate with logistics agents to ensure trucks can be accepted.
General	All smooth flowing and no major delays on inbound trucks recorded so far this week. High stock capacity at FPT and MFT could result in bottlenecks and delays until stock levels subside. 800 Citrus containers expected to load out of Durban and 4 Specialized Reefer Ships calling Durban this week loading out an expected 30,000 pallets from stock. Durban cold store stocks have increased quite substantially this week as was expected. The first reefer train was dispatched from Tzaneen station at 09:00am this morning with a total of 32 containers bound for Durban – see attached photo.
