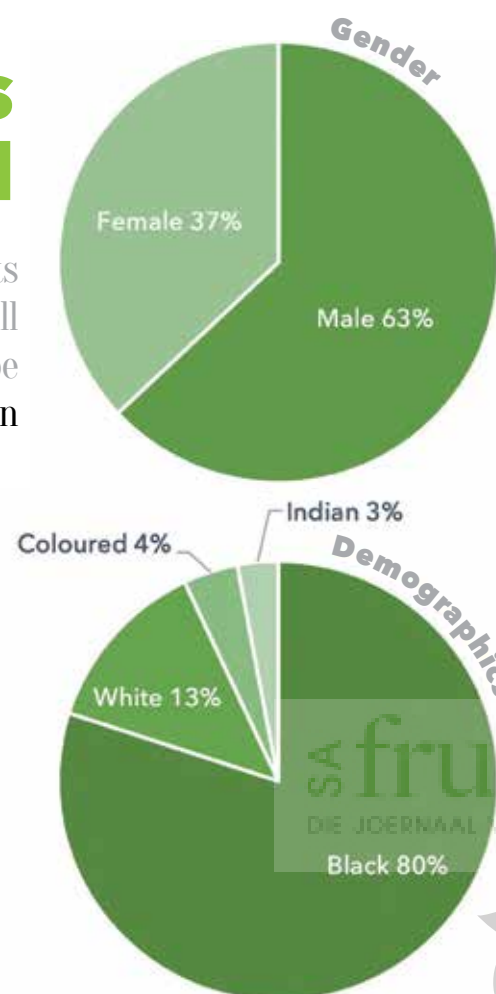

Citrus study groups and information days

Study groups are used as a platform to share expertise and information amongst growers, including production, marketing and any research guidelines. By Andrew Mbedzi

Emerging growers have access to nine citrus study groups countrywide. There are three in Limpopo Province (Mopani, Vhembe and Waterberg), three in the Eastern Cape (Kat River Valley, Sundays River Valley and Patensie), two in KwaZulu-Natal (Nkweleni Valley and Weenen) and one in the North West Province (Bojanala Platinum).

The topics discussed at the study groups relate to the production season and focus areas. Research priorities are also relayed back to researchers through the extension officers, on behalf of the growers. Approximately 25 people attend these study groups.

The information days are usually opportunities to have method or result demonstrations on a slightly larger scale, and are usually attended by approximately 40 people. The purpose of the information days is often to introduce a new idea or crop, and to hopefully pique growers' interest. Experimental stations or other government centres may be used for information days, but it is more impactful and profitable for them to be held on the land of a local farmer.

During the 2019/20 season the attendance of these citrus study groups was halted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. But there was an increase in demand from the growers. Thus, the move from lockdown level 5 to level 1 enabled the CGA Grower Development Company Production and Technical Support Unit to resume the hosting of study groups and information days. All nine citrus study groups are active again, with strict adherence to COVID-19 protocols. The protocols include keeping attendance registers, regular sanitisation, wearing of masks, social distancing, larger venues, and reduced meeting time.
