Pest Control Operator Requirement

This Cutting Edge seeks to summarise the Pest Control Operator (PCO) requirements.

The PCO Regulations of 2011 (Government Notice 98 in Government Gazette 34020 dated 18 February 2011) require that a registered PCO in the field of agriculture and forestry supervise the purchase and use of **restricted agricultural remedies** on farm. The CGA previously indicated which products registered for use on citrus in South Africa are restricted (Cutting Edge No. 410 and 414). Please take note that the restriction is based on final product formulation and not only the active ingredient(s) present. This means that different product registrations with the same active ingredient may not all be restricted. Parties with access to the Agri Intel database can also view the product restriction status there.

Due to challenges (mainly the high cost of compliance and implementation timeline) and uncertainties arising from grey areas in the regulations (for example, how many licences per farm or enterprise would be sufficient), the CGA requested that the Registrar of Act 36 consider a phase-in of the regulations to ensure grower compliance. After engagement with the Registrar's Office, it became clear that a phase-in of the regulation cannot be considered and the PCO requirement is already legally in force. Because it is a national law, it will also form part of SIZA and GLOBALG.A.P. standards and on-farm audits.

When do you need a PCO licence?

Only when you want to purchase and use restricted agricultural remedies. Plant protection product distributors may no longer sell restricted agricultural remedies to persons in the absence of a PCO licence in the relevant field.

Who can apply for a PCO licence?

Any South African resident, 18 years or older, with the following credentials can immediately apply for a PCO licence:

- A degree or diploma in a biological field such as Entomology, Plant Pathology, Crop Protection, Weed Science or any other relevant field (specifically with

subjects pertaining to the use of agricultural remedies). If applicants are uncertain if their credentials meet the requirements as stipulated in Part ii section 2 (1) of the Regulations, they are advised to email a copy of their degree or diploma with a detailed description of the subjects they completed to the Department of Agriculture first before applying for a licence (refer to Mr David Motloi, DavidM@nda.gov.za and Mr Mulisa Raligidima, MulisaR@nda.gov.za).

- If you already completed an AgriSETA-approved AVCASA or PCO short course. The Department of Agriculture might require an AgriSETA confirmation letter linked to the short course training (please note that some qualifications are subject to renewal, we recommend that you verify that courses completed in the past are still valid and meet the requirements).

If you do not have either of these credentials, you will have to complete a PCO short course first. This course must be credit-bearing (certified by the AgriSETA) and presented by an accredited institution or skills development provider. After completing the short course, applicants will have to complete six months of supervised training in the handling of restricted agricultural remedies under the supervision of a registered PCO in the relevant field. This is a limitation, due to the current shortage of registered PCOs in agriculture and forestry across the country. A request was made to the Department of Agriculture to waive the six months practical experience for individuals with prior on-the-job experience. In other words, if you have previous experience in the handling of agricultural remedies, but you do not have the required tertiary education to immediately apply for a PCO licence, you will still have to complete a PCO short course, but you will not be expected to undergo the six months supervised training under a registered PCO. **To date, recognition of prior experience has not been approved by the Department of Agriculture.**

Several skills development providers have PCO short courses available, some in-person and some online. The Citrus Academy has also developed an online PCO short course. The aim was to offer a fruit industry orientated course at a more affordable price, compared to some of the current short course offerings. The course is aligned with registered unit standards on NQF levels 2 and 4, and Citrus Academy is an accredited skills development provider. How do you apply for a PCO licence?

Complete the PCO Application Form of 1 April 2025. This process will require the following information/documentation:

- A medical evaluation by a licenced General Practitioner or Occupational Health and Safety Practitioner (the questions that need to be addressed by the doctor are specified in the PCO application form).
- Proof of payment of the administration fee to the Department of Agriculture (the fee changes annually and is reflected in the latest PCO application form).
- Copy of your ID.
- Copy of your credentials (relevant degree, diploma or short course certificate).
- An affidavit summarising your experience in handling restricted agricultural remedies. TAKE NOTE: It is important to complete this section as thoroughly as possible. The Registrar will evaluate the applicant's understanding based on this summary (i.e. which remedies you are using, what active ingredient it contains, which pests/diseases are targeted, personal protective equipment and apparatus used when applying the remedy, storage of the remedies, etc.). For clarity: If you have the required degree or diploma, you still need to complete the affidavit summarising the remedies you've used during practical subjects and/or on-the-job-experience, but your affidavit does not need to be signed off by a registered PCO supervisor. If you don't have the required degree or diploma, you will need to complete a PCO short course and gain six months supervised training under a registered PCO in the relevant field before you can complete the affidavit – your affidavit needs to be signed off by the registered PCO supervisor. This is the current situation prior to confirmation by the Department of Agriculture that the six months supervision period may be waived based on recognition of previous experience.
- Copy of your supervisor's (registered PCO) registration certificate – ONLY if you require the six months supervised training under a PCO.

Currently the Department of Agriculture does not accept any online applications. Documentation should be delivered in-person or directly couriered to their offices. Kindly use the details provided below for submissions:

Note that a PCO licence is valid for three years.

How many licences per farm or enterprise are required?

The PCO Regulations do not specify the number of licences needed per farm or enterprise. It is up to each business to determine this based on an internal risk assessment. It is important to note that the PCO will be held accountable for the following according to the PCO Regulations of 2011:

- Staying abreast with the latest regulatory developments (applicable by laws, national laws and regulations).
- The direct supervised use of all restricted agricultural remedies on farm.
- Making sure that products are used, stored and disposed of in a safe manner and according to the registered label.
- Adequate training of the end-users supervised by him or her and making the Safety Data Sheets readily available.
- Detailed recordkeeping of the remedies.
- Proper equipment used to mix, load and apply the remedies.
- Treatment and warning notices prior to application.
- Taking reasonable precautions to prevention of spray drift from the treated area.

What is the cost per PCO licence?

If you already have the required credentials, the cost will be approximately **R3 791.00** per licence based on:

- The current admin fee determined by the South African National Treasury of R3 141.00
- Average of R500.00 for a doctor's appointment
- Average of R150.00 courier fee

If you do not have the required credentials, the cost will be approximately **R6 291.00** per licence based on:

- R2 500.00 for the Citrus Academy PCO Short Course
- The current admin fee determined by the South African National Treasury of R3 141.00
- Average of R500.00 for a doctor's appointment
- Average of R150.00 courier fee



It is worth highlighting that while the industry is willing to demonstrate compliance, the high cost of obtaining a single PCO licence was emphasised in numerous engagements with the Department of Agriculture. Growers are advised to use alternative, non-restricted products where feasible to avoid having to obtain a PCO licence.

Plaaigbeheer-operateurvereistes

Hierdie Snykant poog om die vereistes vir Plaaigbeheer-operateurs (PCO) saam te vat.

Die PCO-Regulasies van 2011 (Goewermenskennisgewing 98 in Staatskoerant 34020 gedateer 18 Februarie 2011) vereis dat 'n geregistreerde PCO in die landbou- en bosbouveld toesig hou oor die aankoop en gebruik van beperkte landboumiddels op 'n plaas. Die CGA het voorheen aangedui watter produkte wat in Suid-Afrika vir gebruik op sitrus geregistreer is, beperk is (Snykant Nr. 410 en 414). Neem asseblief kennis dat die beperking op die finale produkformulering gebaseer is en nie slegs afhang van die aktiewe bestanddeel nie. Dit beteken dat verskillende produkregistrasies met dieselfde aktiewe bestanddeel nie noodwendig almal beperk is nie. Partye met toegang tot die Agri Intel-databasis kan ook die produkte se beperkingstatus daar nasien.

Weens uitdagings (hoofsaaklik die hoë koste van nakoming en implementeringstydlyn) en onsekerhede wat ontstaan a.g.v. grys areas in die regulasies (byvoorbeeld, hoeveel lisensies per plaas of onderneming voldoende sal wees), het die CGA versoek dat die Registrateur van Wet 36 'n infasering van die regulasies oorweeg om produsent-nakoming te verseker. Ná gesprekke met die Registrateur se kantoor, het dit duidelik geword dat 'n infasering nie oorweeg kan word nie en dat die PCO-vereiste reeds van krag is. Omdat dit 'n nasionale wet is, sal dit ook deel vorm van SIZA- en GLOBALG.A.P.-standaarde en op-plaas outitering.

Wanneer het jy 'n PCO-lisensie nodig?

Slegs wanneer jy beperkte landboumiddels wil aankoop en gebruik. Verspreiders van plantbeskermingsprodukte mag nie langer beperkte landboumiddels verkoop aan persone sonder toesig van 'n PCO in die betrokke veld nie.

Wie kan vir 'n PCO-lisensie aansoek doen?

Enige Suid-Afrikaanse inwoner, 18 jaar of ouer, met die volgende kwalifikasies kan onmiddellik aansoek doen vir 'n PCO-lisensie:

- 'n Graad of diploma in 'n biologiese veld soos Entomologie, Plantpatologie, Gewasbeskerming,

Onkruidkunde of enige ander relevante veld (spesifiek met vakke wat verband hou met die gebruik van landboumiddels). Indien aansoekers onseker is of hul kwalifikasies aan die vereistes voldoen soos in Deel ii, artikel 2 (1) van die Regulasies uiteengesit is, word hulle aangeraai om eers 'n afskrif van hul graad of diploma saam met 'n gedetailleerde beskrywing van die voltooide vakke aan die Departement van Landbou te e-pos voordat hulle aansoek doen vir 'n PCO-lisensie (kontak mnr. David Motloi, DavidM@nda.gov.za en mnr. Mulisa Raligidima, MulisaR@nda.gov.za).

- Indien jy reeds 'n AgriSETA-goedgekeurde AVCASA- of PCO-kortkursus voltooi het. Die Departement van Landbou mag 'n AgriSETA-bevestigingsbrief verlang wat aan die kortkursus gekoppel is. (Let asseblief op dat sekere kwalifikasies hernu moet word; ons beveel aan dat jy bevestig dat kursusse wat jy in die verlede voltooi het steeds geldig is en aan die vereistes voldoen.)

Indien jy nie een van hierdie kwalifikasies het nie, sal jy eers 'n PCO-kortkursus moet voltooi. Hierdie kursus moet kredietdraend wees (gesertifiseer deur AgriSETA) en aangebied word deur 'n geakkrediteerde instelling of vaardigheidsontwikkelingsverskaffer. Ná voltooiing van die kortkursus, moet aansoekers ses maande praktiese ondervinding in die hantering van beperkte landboumiddels onder toesig van 'n geregistreerde PCO in die betrokke veld voltooi. Dit is 'n beperking weens die huidige tekort aan geregistreerde PCO's in landbou en bosbou landwyd. 'n Versoek is aan die Departement van Landbou gerig om die ses maande praktiese ondervinding te kwytskeld vir individue met vorige praktiese werkservaring. Met ander woorde, indien jy vorige ervaring het in die hantering van landboumiddels, maar nie die vereiste tersiële opleiding het om onmiddellik vir 'n PCO-lisensie aansoek te doen nie, sal jy steeds 'n PCO-kortkursus moet voltooi, maar jy sal nie die ses maande praktiese ervaring voltooi onder 'n geregistreerde PCO nie. **Tot op hede is erkenning van vorige ervaring nog nie deur die Departement van Landbou goedgekeur nie.**

Verskeie vaardigheidsontwikkelingsverskaffers bied PCO-kortkursusse aan, sommige in-persoon en sommige aanlyn. Die Sitrus-akademie het ook 'n aanlyn PCO-kortkursus ontwikkel. Die doel was om 'n vrugtebedryf-georiënteerde kursus teen 'n meer bekostigbare prys aan te bied, in vergelyking met sommige van die huidige kursusaanbiedinge. Die kursus is in lyn met geregistreerde



eenhede op NQF-vlakke 2 en 4, en die Sitrus-akademie is 'n geakkrediteerde vaardigheidsontwikkelingsverskaffer. Let asseblief ook op dat CGA-lede 20% afslag kry op alle Sitrus-akademie-kursusse deur die afslagkode CGAMEM tydens afrekening in te voer.

Hoe doen jy aansoek vir 'n PCO-lisensie?

Voltooi die PCO-aansoekvorm van 1 April 2025. Hierdie proses sal die volgende inligting/dokumentasie vereis:

- 'n Mediese evaluering deur 'n gelisensieerde Algemene Praktisyn of Bedryfs-gesondheidspraktisyn (die vrae wat deur die dokter beantwoord moet word, is in die PCO-aansoekvorm gespesifiseer).
- Bewys van betaling van die administrasiefooi aan die Departement van Landbou (die fooi verander jaarliks en word in die nuutste PCO-aansoekvorm aangedui).
- Afskrif van jou ID.
- Afskrif van jou kwalifikasies (relevante graad, diploma of kortkursusertifikaat).
- 'n Beëdigde verklaring wat jou ervaring in die hantering van beperkte landboumiddels opsom. LET WEL: Dit is belangrik om hierdie afdeling so volledig moontlik in te vul. Die Registrateur sal die aansoeker se begrip evalueer op grond van hierdie opsomming (d.w.s. watter middels jy gebruik, watter aktiewe bestanddeel dit bevat, teen watter plaes/siektes dit gemik is, persoonlike beskermende toerusting en apparate wat gebruik is tydens toediening van die middel, berging van die middels, ens.). Ter verduideliking: Indien jy die vereiste graad of diploma het, moet jy steeds die beëdigde verklaring voltooi wat die middels opsom wat jy tydens praktiese vakke en/of werkservaring gebruik het, maar jou verklaring hoef nie deur 'n geregistreerde PCO-toesighouer onderteken te word nie. Indien jy nie die vereiste graad of diploma het nie, sal jy 'n PCO-kortkursus moet voltooi en ses maande praktiese ervaring onder 'n geregistreerde PCO in die betrokke veld moet ondergaan voordat jy die verklaring kan voltooi – jou verklaring moet deur die geregistreerde PCO-toesighouer onderteken word. Dit is die huidige situasie totdat die Departement van Landbou bevestig dat die 6 maande toesigperiode moontlik kwytkeskel kan word op grond van erkenning van vorige ervaring.

- Afskrif van jou toesighouer se PCO registrasiesertifikaat – SLEGS indien jy die ses maande opleiding onder 'n PCO nodig het.

Die Departement van Landbou aanvaar tans geen aanlyn-aansoeke nie. Dokumentasie moet persoonlik of per koerier direk by hul kantore afgelewer word. Gebruik asseblief die onderstaande besonderhede:

Neem kennis dat 'n PCO-lisensie geldig is vir drie jaar.

Hoeveel lisensies per plaas of onderneming word vereis?

Die PCO-regulasies spesifiseer nie die aantal lisensies wat per plaas of onderneming nodig is nie. Elke besigheid moet dit self bepaal op grond van 'n interne risiko-analise. Dit is belangrik om te weet dat die PCO vir die volgende verantwoordelik gehou sal word volgens die PCO-Regulasies van 2011:

- Om op hoogte te bly van die nuutste regulatoriese ontwikkelings (toepaslike bywette, nasionale wetten en regulasies).
- Die direkte toesig oor die gebruik van alle beperkte landboumiddels op plaas.
- Om te verseker dat beperkte plantbeskermingsprodukte volgens die geregistreerde etiket en op 'n veilige wyse gebruik en geberg word, asook die veilige wegdoening van die middels.
- Voldoende opleiding van die eindgebruikers en dat die veiligheidsdatablad ("SDS") beskikbaar is.
- Gedetailleerde rekordhouding van die middels.
- Geskikte toerusting vir die meng, vul en toediening van die middels.
- Behandelings- en waarskuwingskennisgewings voor toediening.
- Redelike voorsorgmaatreëls om spuitdrywing vanaf die behandelde area te voorkom.

Wat is die koste per PCO-lisensie?

Indien jy reeds die vereiste kwalifikasies het, sal die koste ongeveer **R3 791.00** per lisensie wees, gebaseer op:

- Die huidige administrasiefooi soos bepaal deur die Suid-Afrikaanse Nasionale Tesourier van R3 141.00
- Gemiddeld van R500.00 vir 'n doktersafspraak
- Gemiddeld van R150.00 koerierfooi



Indien jy nie die vereiste kwalifikasies het nie, sal die koste ongeveer **R6 291.00** per lisensie wees, gebaseer op:

- R2 500.00 vir die Sitrus-akademie-PCO-kortkursus
- Die huidige administrasiefooi soos bepaal deur die Suid-Afrikaanse Nasionale Tesourier van R3 141.00
- Gemiddeld van R500.00 vir 'n doktersafspraak
- Gemiddeld van R150.00 koerierfooi

Dit is die moeite werd om te beklemtoon dat, hoewel die bedryf bereid is om nakoming te demonstreer, die hoë koste van die verkryging van 'n enkele PCO-lisensie in talle gesprekke met die Departement van Landbou beklemtoon is. Produsente word aangeraai om alternatiewe, nie-bepaalde produkte waar moontlik te gebruik om die verkryging van 'n PCO-lisensie te vermy.



Restricted Agricultural Remedies and the Pest Control Operator Licence

This Cutting Edge seeks to clarify recent changes associated with the legal use of crop protection products, including by growers. These changes originate from Act No. 36 of 1947 and will impact citrus producers going forward. First, an explanation of the restricted agricultural remedies is provided, followed by the need for a pest control operator licence when these products are purchased or used.

Restricted Agricultural Remedies

Restricted agricultural remedies were defined in regulations published in August 2023 under the Fertilizers, Farms Feeds, Agricultural Remedies, and Stock Remedies Act (No. 36 of 1947). Registration holders of all restricted agricultural products (based on their final formulation and not merely the active ingredient) had to submit labels and safety data sheets to the Registrar's Office by the end of October 2024 for restriction amendments. Restricted agricultural remedies will now have a restriction notice shown on the product labels and safety data sheets, and their sale and use are limited to persons with an appropriate licence or those supervised by someone with such a licence. Crop Life SA subsequently published a list of the restricted agricultural remedies in December 2024, based on the information provided by the registration holders.

The restricted agricultural remedies should not be confused with the substances of concern classified as a 1A or 1B Carcinogen, Mutagen, or Reproductive Toxin – which is a separate matter being dealt with by the Registrar's office.

Pest Control Operator Licence

According to The Pest Control Operator Regulations of 18 February 2011, buyers and end-users of restricted agricultural remedies need a pest control operator (PCO) licence or be directly supervised by a registered PCO. However, because the affected agricultural remedies were

only recently restricted and communicated as such, this is a fairly new regulatory development.

Persons with a degree or diploma in agriculture can apply for a PCO license at the Registrar's Office. The indication from the Registrar is that these applications will be prioritised to prevent pest and disease outbreaks on farms, due to a lack of PCO licences. Stakeholders are encouraged to see Crop Life's communication for details on who requires a PCO licence and how to obtain such a licence.¹

Persons without a degree or diploma in agriculture will need to complete a short course in the safe handling of restricted remedies at any of the recognized institutions (see Crop Life SA list)². After completing the short course, they will require at least 6 months of practical experience in the use of restricted remedies under the supervision of a registered PCO. The practicality of this arrangement was raised as a concern due to the current lack of registered PCOs.

The PCO requirement was previously communicated at the Citrus Sustainability Forum of 4 October 2024. At the time, industry bodies could submit feedback to Crop Life SA and CGA/CRI supported the suggested phase-in period of the requirement, as well as fast-tracking licences for growers or end-users with the appropriate credentials. The Citrus Academy circulated a PCO Grower Survey shortly thereafter to determine how many citrus growers have a PCO licence or could immediately apply for one, having the necessary qualifications and experience.³ The feedback, although limited, showed that the majority of the participants, or someone within their enterprise, could immediately apply for a PCO license.

CGA/CRI conducted a risk assessment to determine which restricted agricultural products are registered for use on citrus or in citrus orchards and whether suitable alternative products that are not restricted exist. This assessment showed that some pre-harvest insecticides and herbicides will be affected (see Annex 1), and limited access to some of these products might be problematic. The restricted agricultural products are also now indicated as such on the Agri-Intel database.

Beperkte landbou-chemiese produkte en die plaagbeheer-operateurlisensie

Hierdie Snykant beoog om duidelikheid te verskaf aan sitrusprodusente aangaande onlangse veranderinge rakende die wettige gebruik van sekere landbou-chemiese produkte. Hierdie veranderinge kom van Wet No. 36 van 1947 en sal 'n impak hê op sitrusprodusente. Eerstens word 'n verduideliking van die beperkings op landboumiddels gegee, gevolg deur die vereiste van 'n plaagbeheer-operateurlisensie wanneer hierdie produkte gekoop of gebruik word.

Beperkte landbou-chemiese middels

Beperkte landbou-chemiese middels word gedefinieer in 'n regulasie wat in Augustus 2023 gepubliseer was onder die Kunsmis, Plaasvoere, Landboumiddels en Veemiddels Wet (Nr. 36 van 1947). Registrasiehouers van alle beperkte landbou-chemiese produkte (gebaseer op die finale produkformulasie en nie nét die aktiewe bestanddeel nie) moes etikette en dokumentasie oor veiligheidsdata teen die einde van Oktober 2024 by die Registrateur se kantoor indien vir aanpassings van etikette, om aan te dui dat die middels beperk is. Beperkte landbou-chemiese middels sal nou 'n beperkingskennisgewing op die produk-etiket en dokumentasie oor veiligheidsdata hê, en die verkoop en gebruik sal beperk wees tot persone met 'n lisensie of dié wat onder direkte toesig van 'n gelisensieerde persoon val. Crop Life SA het in Desember 2024 'n lys van die beperkte landbou-chemiese middels gepubliseer, gebaseer op die inligting wat deur die registrasiehouers verskaf is.

Die beperkte landbou-chemiese middels moet nie verwar word met kommerwekkende middels (die sogenaamde *substances of concern*) wat geklassifiseer word as 'n 1A of 1B Karsinogeen, Mutageen of Reproductiewe Toksien nie – wat 'n aparte saak is wat deur die Registrateur se kantoor hanteer word.

Plaagbeheer-operateurlisensie

Volgens die Plaagbeheer-operateurregulasie van 18 Februarie 2011 moet kopers en eindgebruikers van beperkte landbou-chemiese middels 'n plaagbeheer-operateurlisensie (*pest control operator* of te wel PCO-lisensie) hê, of direk onder toesig wees van 'n geregistreerde PCO. Omdat die betrokke landbou-chemiese middels egter eers onlangs as beperk geklassifiseer en gekommunikeer is, is hierdie 'n redelike nuwe regulatoriese ontwikkeling.

Persone met 'n graad of diploma in landbou kan by die Registrateur se kantoor aansoek doen vir 'n PCO-lisensie. Die Registrateur het aangedui dat hierdie aansoeke geprioritiseer sal word om plaag- en siekte-uitbrake op plase te voorkom as gevolg van 'n tekort aan PCO-lisensies. Belanghebbendes word aangemoedig om Crop Life se kommunikasie te raadpleeg vir besonderhede oor wie 'n PCO-lisensie benodig en hoe om dit te bekom.¹

Persone sonder 'n graad of diploma in landbou sal 'n kort kursus in die veilige hantering van beperkte landbou-chemiese middels by enige van die erkende instellings moet voltooi (sien Crop Life SA-lys)². Ná voltooiing van die kursus sal hulle ten minste ses maande praktiese ondervinding moet opdoen in die gebruik van beperkte middels, onder toesig van 'n geregistreerde PCO. Die praktiese uitvoerbaarheid van hierdie reëling is as 'n bekommernis aangedui weens die huidige tekort aan geregistreerde PCO's.

Die PCO-vereiste is reeds op 4 Oktober 2024 tydens die aanlyn Sitrus Volhoubaarheidforum (*Citrus Sustainability Forum*) gekommunikeer. Op daardie stadium kon industrie-liggame terugvoer aan Crop Life SA indien, en CGA/CRI het die voorstel ondersteun om 'n infaseringstydperk vir die vereiste toe te laat, asook die versnelde uitreiking van lisensies vir produsente of eindgebruikers met die nodige kwalifikasies. Die Sitrus Akademie het kort daarna 'n PCO-produsente-opname uit gestuur om te bepaal hoeveel sitrusprodusente reeds 'n PCO-lisensie het of dadelik vir een kon aansoek doen op grond van hulle kwalifikasies en ervaring.³ Die terugvoer, alhoewel beperk, het getoon dat die meerderheid deelnemers, of iemand binne hul onderneming, onmiddellik vir 'n PCO-lisensie kon aansoek doen.



CGA/CRI het 'n risiko-assessering gedoen om te bepaal watter beperkte landbou-chemiese produkte vir gebruik op sitrus of in sitrusboorde geregistreer is, en of daar geskikte alternatiewe produkte beskikbaar is wat nie beperk is nie. Hierdie assessering het getoon dat sommige van die voor-oes insekdoders en onkruidodders geraak sal word (sien Bylae 1), en beperkte toegang tot sommige van hierdie produkte moontlik problematies kan wees. Die beperkte landbou-chemiese produkte word nou ook so aangedui in die Agri-Intel-databasis.

Crop Life SA sal op **4 Februarie 2025 om 09:00** 'n aanlyn opleidingsessie aanbied om te verduidelik hoe om vir 'n PCO-lisensie aansoek te doen. Sien asseblief aanhegsel nr. 4 vir die agenda en Microsoft Teams-besonderhede om aan te sluit.⁴

Noticeably, all the formetanate, methamidaphos, mevinphos, prothiofos and 10 of the 12 methomyl products are now restricted.

Restricted Use Agricultural Remedies – What does it mean for farm owners and agricultural workers?

Released by CropLife South Africa: 24 January 2025

The new regulations relating to agricultural remedies were published on 23 August 2023 under the Fertilizer, Farm Feeds, Agricultural Remedies and Stock Remedies Act (Act No. 36 of 1947), which defined a new class of agricultural remedies referred to as restricted agricultural remedies. These remedies are agricultural remedies for which the Registrar has set out certain limitations on the sale and use of the products, as well as certain conditions for the labelling thereof.

It is important to note that restricted agricultural remedies are not the same as substances of concern, some of which are currently being phased out in South Africa. Restricted remedies and substances of concern both fall in the category of highly hazardous pesticides, however, the criteria for these two classes differ. The criteria for restricted agricultural remedies are mostly dependent on the remedy being regarded as acutely toxic. Substances of concern on the other hand are mostly regarded as toxic by chronic exposure, such as the potential of the substance to cause cancer, induce genetic mutations or interfere with reproduction or the unborn child over long-term exposure. These criteria, however, are not mutually exclusive and some remedies may fulfil the criteria for both classifications.

Although restricted agricultural remedies were only defined in the Regulations relating to agricultural remedies in 2023, the requirement for these remedies to be restricted to pest control operators (PCOs) has been included in the Pest Control Operator Regulations since 2011. These regulations stipulate that employees who handle restricted agricultural remedies specifically must be registered as PCOs or perform such duties under the direct supervision of a registered PCO. This means that a registered PCO must be physically present at the time and place where restricted agricultural remedies are applied.

In addition, these remedies may only be sold to a registered PCO, who, upon purchase will need to provide proof that they are sufficiently qualified and registered to administer the remedy. In both cases (sales and application), the PCO must be registered within the applicable field of registration related to the remedy being sold, for instance, if a remedy is sold for use in agriculture (excluding aerial application or fumigation which has their own fields of registration), the PCO must be registered in the field of agriculture and forestry.

If the designated person responsible for acquisition of agricultural remedies on a farm is not the person who is registered as a PCO and applying or overseeing the application of these restricted agricultural remedies, it is possible for a designated person who is not a PCO to purchase a restricted agricultural remedy on behalf of a registered PCO. In this case the PCO must accompany the representative to the supplier or distributor for the first purchase. They will have to provide a certified copy of the PCO registration certificate and a signed letter to the supplier or distributor giving consent to the designated person to purchase the restricted remedy on their behalf; said PCO certificate and consent letter must be kept on file by the supplier or distributor. Note however, that this sales restriction applies to the end-user of the product only, such as the farm owner or agricultural worker. In other words, if a supplier sells an agricultural remedy to a distributor or agent, who then sells the agricultural remedy to the end-user, the distributor or agent does not need to be registered as a PCO.

In addition, the regulations also stipulate that a restriction notice must appear on the label of the agricultural remedy to indicate the limitations on use. Registration holders of restricted use agricultural remedies had until 31 October 2024 to submit their revised labels to the Registrar for approval, meaning some of the products currently in circulation may not yet display the notice on the main panel, however, some of them could include an approved over-sticker with the necessary

notice as an interim measure until the new stock with the approved label is in circulation. These restrictions will also appear in Section 1 of the safety data sheet (SDS).

It is of paramount importance that all players in the value chain understand what their responsibilities are in terms of these products so that we can ensure compliance with all the necessary laws and regulations governing the industry.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Examples – When is a PCO registration required for restricted use agricultural remedies?

- A farm owner who buys restricted use remedies to apply on his/her farm? **Yes.**
- An agricultural worker who buys restricted use remedies on behalf of the farm owner to apply on the farm? **Yes.**
- A farm owner, agricultural worker or designated person who buys restricted use agricultural remedies on behalf of a PCO? **No, but the PCO will need to be appropriately registered and provide the necessary documentation to the supplier or distributor selling the restricted agricultural remedies.**
- A farm owner or agricultural worker who applies restricted use remedies? **Yes, unless the person operates under the direct supervision (i.e. physically present at the time of application) of an appropriately registered PCO.**
- A sales agent who buys restricted use remedies from a supplier to sell to a farm owner or representative? **No.**
- A farm owner or agricultural worker who buys or applies an agricultural remedy that is not classified as a restricted use remedy? **No.**
- The manufacturer of the remedy selling it to a distributor, farm owner or agricultural worker? **No, but whoever is selling to the end-user must ensure that the end-user is appropriately registered as a PCO or that they have the relevant documentation to purchase the remedy on behalf of the PCO.**

Process for obtaining a PCO license

Pest control operators are also regulated under Act No. 36 of 1947, and a person must apply to the Registrar of Act No. 36 of 1947 of the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) to become registered as a PCO. The application forms are available on the DALRRD website. Pest control operators are registered for specialised areas of pest control and the following fields of registration are available:

- Fumigation
- Aerial application
- Agriculture and forestry
- Industrial vegetation and noxious weeds
- Landscape
- Supplemental and/or remedial wood treatment
- Structural
- Any other relevant specialisation

Each field necessitates specialised training and registration to ensure that the PCO has the appropriate knowledge and skills to safely and successfully apply the restricted remedy. As a result, a PCO who is registered to conduct fumigation may not administer structural pest control remedies unless obtaining additional structural pest control registration. Remedies that are registered for use in agriculture will require a PCO to be registered for the field of agriculture and forestry.

- The fees for applying for registration as a PCO are promulgated annually by DALRRD in the Government Gazette. Below are some of the key requirements and steps to obtain PCO registration:

- A person must do an accredited PCO course to obtain a national certificate in pest control from a relevant accredited academy in the field of his/her specialisation. Please note that such a certificate is not a PCO registration, it merely serves as proof to DALRRD that the applicant has been trained appropriately in a particular field of expertise.
- The person must then undergo practical and experiential training under a registered PCO for six to 12 months, depending on the relevant field of registration, after which the person must be assessed by an accredited assessor to ascertain whether the person is qualified to apply for PCO registration.
 - A person with a diploma or degree in a biological field such as entomology, pathology, crop protection, weed science, or any relevant qualification may be exempted from the requirement of practical experience depending on prior experience.
- The person must undergo a medical examination by a registered health care practitioner and must submit the template report completed by a qualified medical practitioner with their application.
- The person must submit the application for registration as a PCO to the Registrar of Act No. 36 of 1947 using the appropriate application forms including proof of accredited training, assessment or tertiary qualifications, health certificate and payment of the required application fees.

Following the approval of the PCO registration application, the PCO registration certificate will be valid for a period of three years. To retain the registration, the PCO must submit a renewal application before the validity term expires.

INFORMATION REGARDING THE REGISTRATION OF A PEST CONTROL OPERATOR IN ACCORDANCE WITH ACT NO. 36 OF 1947

Pest control operators (PCO's) are regulated under Act No. 36 of 1947, and a person must apply to the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) to become registered. Pest control operators are certified in specialised areas of pest control. Each field necessitates specialised training and certification to ensure that the PCO has the appropriate knowledge and skills to safely and successfully apply the restricted remedy. As a result, a PCO certified to conduct fumigation may not administer structural pest control remedies unless obtaining additional structural pest control certification. Remedies that are registered for use in agriculture (with the exception of aerial application and fumigation), will require a PCO to be certified in the field of "agriculture and forestry".

Accompanying this letter is the documentation circulated by DALRRD that describes the process of registration of a PCO. Below are some of the key requirements:

- A person must do a course to obtain a national certificate in pest control from a relevant accredited academy.
- The person must obtain practical experience under a registered PCO for 6 to 12 months, depending on the relevant field of certification.
- A person with a diploma or degree in a biological field such as entomology, pathology, crop protection, weed science, or any relevant qualification may be exempted from the requirement of practical experience depending on prior experience.
- The person should undergo a medical examination and must submit the template report completed by a qualified medical practitioner with their application.

Following the approval of the PCO application, the certificate will be valid for a period of three years. To retain the certificate, the PCO must submit a renewal application before the validity term expires. It is essential that PCOs provide evidence that they are competent and actively working in the field in which they have obtained the certificate. To help the industry register PCOs, the following is a list of accredited academies that offer national certificate in pest control.

Pest Management Academy

The Pest Management Academy (PMA) offers a Level 4 NQF course in Agriculture and Forestry as part of its skills development program. Available in both classroom and E-learning formats, the classroom sessions are held over three days on scheduled dates, while the E-learning option allows students up to one year to complete the course at their own pace. The academy also offers supervision for pest control operator candidates subject to terms and conditions. For more information on the course offered and PCO supervision, please contact the PMA.

Restricted Agricultural Remedies and the Pest Control Operator Licence

Citrus Growers' Association (CGA)

The CGA/CRI previously published a Cutting Edge regarding the Pest Control Operator Regulations (No. 410 of February 2025) as an introductory message to the industry. Cutting Edge No. 410 aimed to communicate the relatively new development in South Africa, specifically outlining which agricultural remedies registered for use on citrus trees or in citrus orchards (i.e. herbicides) are now restricted.

Summary of the current state of play:

- The Pest Control Operator Regulations were published in 2011 and require that buyers and end-users of restricted agricultural remedies have a Pest Control Operator licence in the field of agriculture and forestry, or be directly supervised by a registered PCO.
- Restricted agricultural remedies (classified as highly hazardous pesticides) were only defined in 2023 and a provisional list of these remedies became available in December 2024. An agricultural remedy is restricted based on its final product formulation, meaning all registered products with the same active substance are not necessarily restricted.
- Individuals with an appropriate degree or diploma in agriculture may immediately apply for a PCO licence at the Act 36 offices. The application process is outlined in the Pest Control Application Form as previously circulated by Crop Life SA (see at the bottom of the Cutting Edge).
- Those without the required credentials must first complete a short course in the relevant PCO field, followed by at least 6 months of supervised training in the use of restricted remedies.

Challenges arising from these developments:

- The cost to obtain one PCO licence is between R9 496.00 and R12 380.00, if short-course and supervised training is required prior to the application. If you can immediately apply for a licence, having the required credentials, the cost is approximately R3 700.00 per licence.

- The currently available credit-bearing PCO short courses in the field of agriculture and forestry are likely to remain the only available options in the next 18 months.
- Based on the current wording of the Regulations, multiple PCO licences might be required per farm, leading to significant financial strain at farm level.
- The required 6 months supervised training under a registered PCO on farm level post short course completion is impractical.
- Some restricted agricultural remedies may not have suitable registered alternatives for certain crops in South Africa, considering factors such as efficacy, pre-harvest intervals, and maximum residue limits in export market destinations. Without a PCO licence, growers may not currently have access to these remedies.

Recent developments regarding the PCO requirement:

- After several engagements with the Registrar's Office, it became apparent that the Registrar may be open for proposals from grower associations on making the regulations more feasible - taking into account the small and large scale enterprises and the reality that many growers and agri-workers in South Africa will not have the necessary credentials to immediately apply for a PCO licence.
- Following extensive discussions among various grower associations and thorough review of the Regulations, a collective decision was made to request that the Registrar consider a phase-in period for compliance. While the industry supports the law, stakeholders emphasized that it should be practical and recognize existing farm-level compliance measures (e.g., audits ensuring correct storage, usage, and training of agricultural remedy end-users).

A list of the restricted agricultural remedies registered for use on citrus or in citrus orchards are shown in Annex 1.

Growers are encouraged to consider using non-restricted agricultural remedies where feasible. If only non-restricted agricultural remedies are used then the requirement for a PCO licence is entirely avoided.

Under the current regulations, if the use of restricted agricultural remedies is unavoidable,



growers should consider obtaining a PCO licence in the field of agriculture and forestry to continuously purchase the remedies. If a suitably qualified person is associated with your enterprise, they may immediately apply for a licence. If not, there are short-course training options available.

It is worth highlighting that the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) is committed to phasing out highly hazardous pesticides (including the restricted agricultural remedies) by 2035 where safer alternatives are available.



Beperkte landbou-chemiese produkte en die plaagbeheer-operateurlisensie

Die CGA/CRI het voorheen 'n Snykant publiseer oor die Plaagbeheeroperateurregulasies (Nr. 410 van Februarie 2025) as 'n inleidende boodskap aan die bedryf. Snykant No. 410 het gepoog om die relatief nuwe ontwikkeling in Suid-Afrika te kommunikeer, spesifiek deur uit te lig watter landbou-chemiesemiddels wat vir gebruik op sitrusbome of in sitrusboorde geregistreer is nou beperk is.

Opsomming van die huidige stand van sake:

- Die Plaagbeheeroperateurregulasies is in 2011 gepubliseer en vereis dat kopers en eindgebruikers van beperkte landboumiddels 'n Plaagbeheeroperateur-lisensie in die veld van landbou en bosbou moet hê, of direk onder toesig van 'n geregistreerde PCO moet wees.
- Beperkte landboumiddels (geklassifiseer as hoogs gevaarlike middels) is eers in 2023 gedefinieer, en 'n voorlopige lys van hierdie middels is in Desember 2024 beskikbaar gestel. 'n Landboumiddel word beperk op grond van sy finale produkformulering, wat beteken dat alle geregistreerde produkte met dieselfde aktiewe-bestanddeel nie noodwendig beperk is nie.
- Individue met 'n toepaslike graad of diploma in landbou kan onmiddellik aansoek doen vir 'n PCO-lisensie by die Wet 36-kantore. Die aansoekproses word uiteengesit in die Plaagbeheer Aansoekvorm soos voorheen gekommunikeer deur Crop Life SA (sien aan die onderkant van hierdie Snykant).
- Diegene sonder die nodige kwalifikasies moet eers 'n kortkursus in die relevante PCO-veld voltooi, gevolg deur minstens 6 maande se ervaring in die gebruik van beperkte middels onder die toesig van 'n PCO.

Uitdagings voortspruitend uit hierdie ontwikkelings:

- Die koste om een PCO-lisensie te bekom, is ongeveer R9 496.00 tot R12 380.00,

indien kortkursus opleiding voor die aansoek vereis word. Indien die individu reeds die nodige kwalifikasies het en onmiddellik aansoek kan doen vir 'n PCO-lisensie, is die koste ongeveer R3 700.00 per lisensie.

- Die vereiste van 6 maande opleiding onder 'n geregistreerde PCO op plaasvlak ná voltooiing van die kortkursus is onprakties.
- Die tans beskikbare kredietdraende PCO-kortkursusse in landbou en bosbou sal waarskynlik vir die volgende 18 maande die enigste opsies bly.
- Op grond van die huidige bewoording van die PCO-regulasies, mag daar dalk baie PCO-lisensies per plaas nodig wees wat aansienlike finansiële druk op plase gaan sit.
- Sommige beperkte landboumiddels het moontlik nie geskikte geregistreerde alternatiewe vir sekere gewasse in Suid-Afrika nie, met inagneming van faktore soos doeltreffendheid, voor-oes-intervalle en maksimum residu-beperkings in uitvoermarkte. Sonder 'n PCO-lisensie mag produsente tans nie toegang tot hierdie middels hê nie.

Onlangse ontwikkelings rakende die PCO-vereiste:

- Na verskeie besprekings met die Registrateur se kantoor het dit duidelik geword dat die Registrateur moontlik oop is vir voorstelle van produsenteverenigings om die regulasies meer uitvoerbaar te maak – met inagneming van kleinskaalse en grootskaalse ondernemings en die realiteit dat baie produsente en landbouwerkers in Suid-Afrika nie die nodige kwalifikasies het om onmiddellik vir 'n PCO-lisensie aansoek te doen nie.
- Na uitgebreide besprekings tussen verskeie produsenteverenigings en 'n deeglike hersiening van die regulasies, is 'n gesamentlike besluit geneem om die Registrateur te versoek om 'n geleidelike infaseringstydperk vir voldoening te oorweeg. Terwyl die bedryf die wet ondersteun, het belanghebbendes beklemtoon dat dit prakties moet wees en bestaande nakomingsmaatreëls op plaasvlak moet erken (bv. oudits om korrekte berging, gebruik en opleiding van landboumiddel-eindgebruikers te verseker).

Produsente word aangemoedig om, waar moontlik, nie-beperkte landboumiddels te gebruik. As slegs nie-beperkte landboumiddels gebruik word, word die vereiste vir 'n PCO-lisensie heeltemal vermy.

Onder die huidige regulasies, indien die gebruik van beperkte landboumiddels onvermydelik is, behoort produsente te oorweeg om 'n PCO-lisensie in die veld van landbou en bosbou te bekom om deurlopend toegang tot die middels te hê. Indien 'n geskikte gekwalifiseerde persoon aan u onderneming gekoppel is, kan hulle onmiddellik aansoek doen vir 'n lisensie. Indien nie, is daar kortkursus-opleidingsopsies beskikbaar.

Dit is die moeite werd om te beklemtoon dat die Departement van Landbou, Grondhervorming en Landelike Ontwikkeling (DALRRD) daartoe verbind is om hoogs gevaarlike landbou-chemiese middels (insluitend die beperkte landboumiddels) teen 2035 uit te faseer, waar veiliger alternatiewe beskikbaar is.

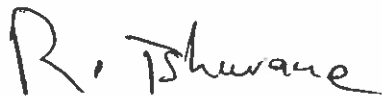
